Asian American, Native Hawaiian, Pacific Islander Heritage Month

This year's AANHPI Heritage Month theme is "[Power in Unity: Strengthening Communities Together](#)", which touches on the many different cultures that are encompassed. Here in the Bay Area we have a significant portion of the population whose family heritage is from Asia, Hawaii or the Pacific Islands.

Some of our libraries have recurring AANHPI-related events, such as bilingual [Mandarin Family Storytimes](#). The Saratoga Library has a [Chinese Book Club](#), while the Milpitas Library offers [Qi Gong Meditation](#) and Exercise classes on Fridays.

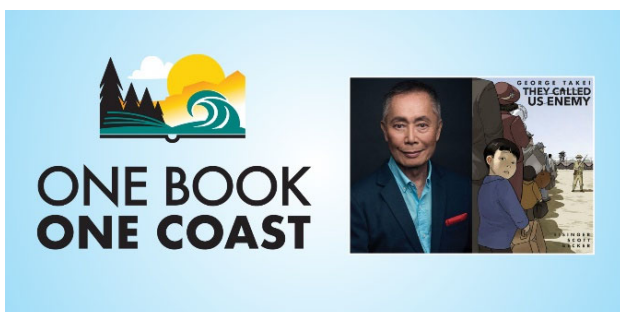

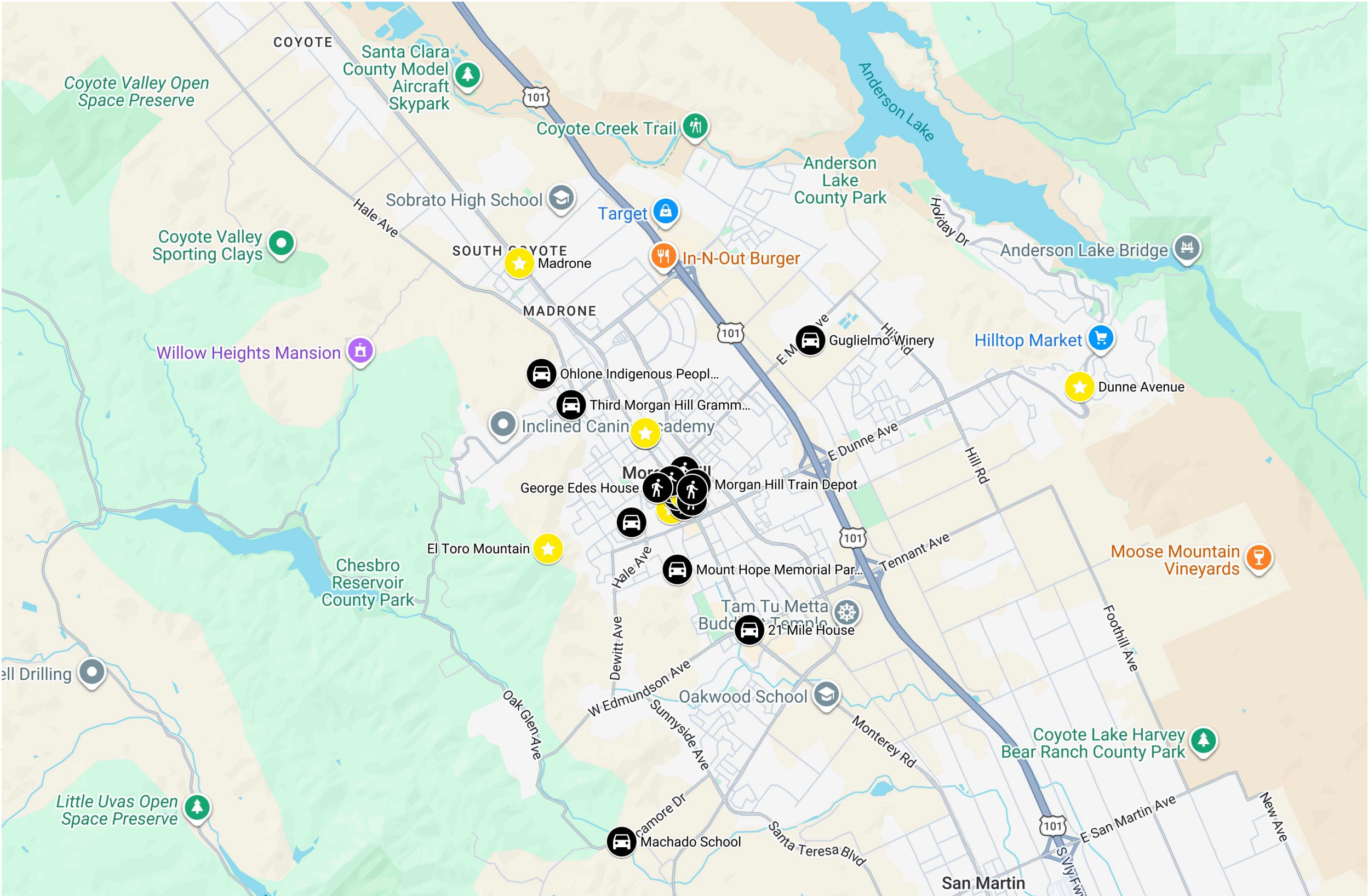
RECOMMENDATION(S)

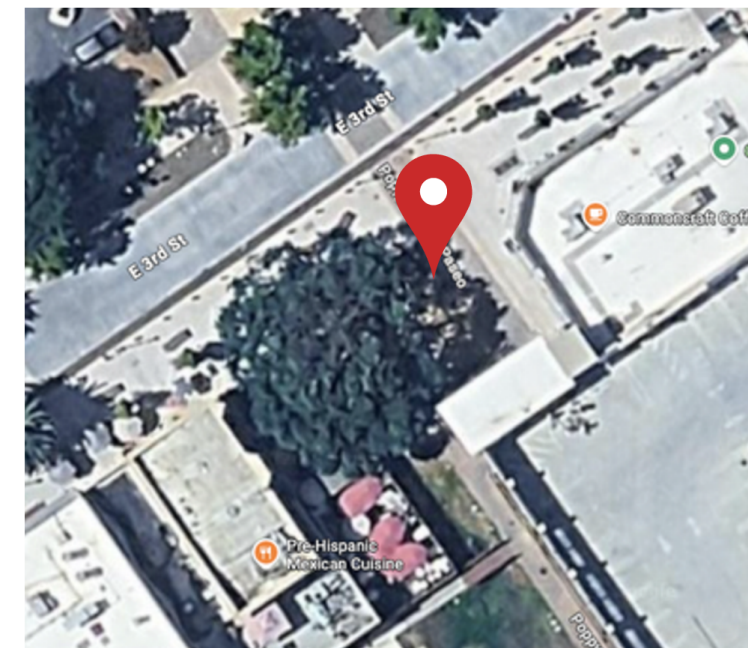

April 2026

OVERVIEW

The Leadership Morgan Hill Class of 2026 is launching a project titled “Many Stories, One Morgan Hill” to establish a permanent historical trail in Morgan Hill. This initiative involves placing markers at up to 20 significant historical points of interest. Each marker will feature a link to a dedicated webpage that provides a detailed, rich narrative about the location and its influence on Morgan Hill's history.

PROJECT GOALS

1. **Expand Historical Tour Offerings:** Broaden the existing Morgan Hill Historical Society downtown walking tour by developing a new, self-guided tour that extends beyond the downtown area.
2. **Integrate Digital and Physical Media:** For all tour stop locations, install physical plaques that include a link to corresponding digital content, hosted on the Morgan Hill Historical Society website.

PHYSICAL PLAQUE SPECIFICATIONS

- **Quantity:** Up to 20 unique plaques with a standardized template and variable text & numbering.
- **Material:** Cast Bronze (Architectural Grade)
- **Shape:** Custom "Mountain Crest" silhouette. The top edge must feature a contoured profile as shown in the reference image.
- **Dimensions:** 16" (W) x 6.67" (H)
- **Thickness:** 5/16" (0.3125") or 3/8" (0.375), depending on foundry standard for this size.
- **Mounting:** 4 Stainless Steel Studs (back-tapped) + 1 Paper Mounting Template per plaque.
- **QR Code & RFID tile:** 3” x 3” ceramic tile will be adhered to the plaque inside a recess
- **Background Texture:** Pebbled or "Leatherette" (as seen in reference) to provide contrast and hide minor surface scratches over time.
- **Background Color:** Dark Oxide or "Statuary Bronze" (Dark Brown/Black).

- **Raised Surface Finish:** Brushed/Satin Gold (Bronze) highlighting.
- **Protective Coating:** High-grade, clear, UV-resistant baked-on polyurethane or powder coat to prevent oxidation and tarnishing.
- **Installation Environment:** Outdoor with high UV and moisture exposure
- **Standard Mounting:** 4 Blind Stud Mounts with Drilling Template.
 - Hardware: Four (4) stainless steel threaded studs (1/4" x 2") to be provided with each plaque.
 - Preparation: The back of the plaque must be tapped to receive studs.

 - Circle: Variable number, e.g., “1” (Large, Bold Serif Font).
 - Top Line: "Morgan Hill Historical Trail" (Medium, Serif Font)
 - Center Line: Variable title, e.g., "Morgan Hill House" (Large, Bold Serif Font)
 - Bottom Line: "Leadership Morgan Hill Class of 2026" (Small, Serif Font)
 - Character/Circle Depth: Raised .05 inches from the background.

QR Code & RFID Tag Integration

Pocket Casting: The plaque shall feature a recessed square area on the right-hand side, measuring 3.1” x 3.1”
